

Business Preparedness

Experts believe a worldwide outbreak, or pandemic, of influenza will happen someday. The exact timing is not known, but it is certain our everyday lives will drastically change during a pandemic. These changes may include temporary closing of schools or cancellation of events, disruption of normal services such as utilities and some shortages. Up to 40 percent of your workforce could be absent. There are things you can do now to prepare. Take time to understand the needs of your business; and take action to help lessen the impact of an influenza pandemic.

	Share BEST PRACTICES with other businesses in your community, chambers of commerce and associations to improve community response efforts. Train and prepare BACK-UP workforce.
	dentify CRITICAL inputs (raw materials, suppliers). Implement guidelines for face-to-face CONTACT (hand shaking, room ayout) to prevent spread of influenza in the workplace.
l	mplement an exercise or DRILL to test your plan periodically.
ŀ	dentify ESSENTIAL EMPLOYEES and functions.
	Determine potential impact on company FINANCIALS . Establish policies for FLEXIBLE workplace (telecommuting) and FLEXIBLE hours.
E	Ensure availability of GUIDANCE and advice during pandemic and emergency response.
E	Evaluate employee access to and availability of HEALTH CARE during a pandemic. Improve services as needed.
	DENTIFY pandemic coordinator and team.
J	OIN local pandemic planning efforts.
F	Provide infection control KITS (hand hygiene, tissues, waste receptacles).
E	Ensure communications are culturally and LINGUISTICALLY appropriate for your workforce.

Ν	Identify and address employees and customers with SPECIAL NEEDS during a pandemic.
0	OFFER links to reliable, up-to-date pandemic information from public health and emergency management sources.
Ρ	Complete emergency communication PLANS that include key contacts (and backups), communication channels and processes.
Q	Disseminate a QUICK GUIDE to PANDEMIC fundamentals such as signs of influenza, modes of transmission, personal and family protection and response strategies. Follow the links provided to download documents for your use.
R	Set up authorities, triggers and procedures for activating and terminating the company's pandemic influenza RESPONSE PLAN (altering business operations, shutting down, transfering knowledge to key employees) and share the finished plan with employees.
S	Develop and plan for SCENARIOS likely to increase or decrease the demand for your product or service during a pandemic.
Т	Determine potential impact on company-related domestic and international TRAVEL (quarantines, border closures) and develop appropriate policies to address.
U	UNDERSTAND the capabilities and plans of insurers, health plans and major health care facilities.
V	Encourage influenza and pneumococcal VACCINATIONS for employees as appropriate and following public health recommendations.
W	Develop platforms, such as hotlines and dedicated WEB SITES , for communicating pandemic status and actions to employees, vendors, suppliers and customers in a consistent and timely manner.
X	Anticipate employee anXiety and plan communications accordingly.
Y	Communicate with local and/or state public health agencies and/or emergency responders about the assets/services YOUR business can contribute to the community.
Ζ	ZIP UP your company's communication and technology infrastructure to support telecommuting and remote access needs.
